Workshop 1: Free, Fabulous Formative Assessment Tools

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Workshop Objective: At the end of the session, you will walk away with several digital formative assessment tools you can use, as well as clearly understand how they enhance the feedback process.

Digging into the Research

Formative assessment is a process used by teachers and students during instruction that provides feedback to adjust ongoing teaching and learning to improve students’ achievement of intended instructional outcomes.

Formative assessment has distinguishing features as follows:

- A process rather than a single event
- A tool useful to both teachers and students
- A source of assessment-based feedback to both teachers and students

Strategy 1: Quick Writes

Students respond to an open-ended question or prompt. This can be done before, during, or after the lesson.

Some useful tools for this include [Mentimeter](#), [Chatzy](#), [Padlet](#), and [Lino](#). Don’t forget to remind students to share something unique and not repeat a classmate’s answer.

Strategy 2: Game-Based Student Response Systems

The teacher can design quizzes with embedded images and video or use one of the many pre-created assessments. Students rely on an internet-connected device to respond, earning points as they score. Some powerful tools are [Kahoot](#), [Quizlet](#), and [Quizziz](#).

Strategy 3: Tests

Build, distribute, and collect the results of a basic test. Some tools include dashboards for student assessment data: [Quizaliner](#), [Testmoz](#), and [Edcite](#).

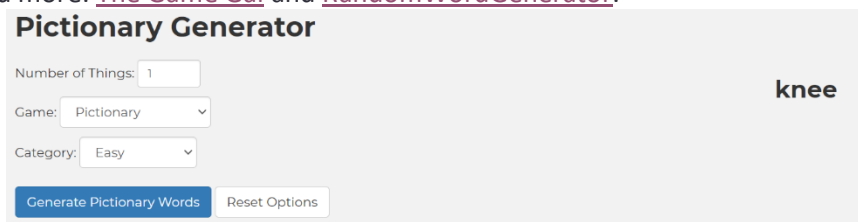
Remember

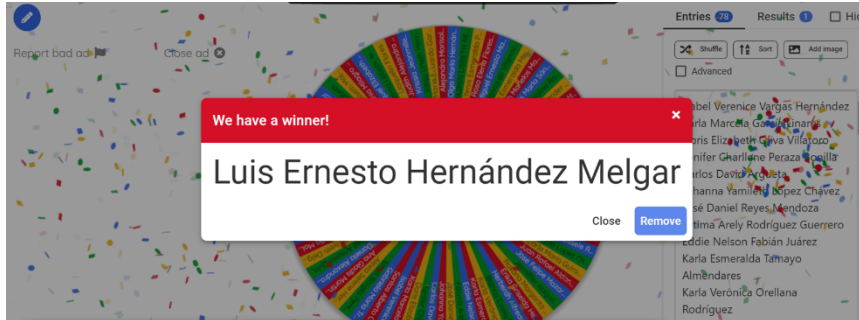
Word Generator

Name Generator

What is your favorite method for randomly choosing names so that every student has a chance to participate? [Wheel of Names](#) is a fun online tool that spins a wheel (ala Wheel of Fortune) to choose who's up next. Simply enter students' names and give it a whirl.



Emoji Prompts

This quick and easy [Random Emoji Generator](#) writing prompter is perfect for busy teachers. Opening the page will produce an emoji that the student should write about. When he runs out of things to say, he can select "And Then" and another random emoji will be produced next to the first one to continue the story.

Try using some of the fun sounds on this [soundboard](#). There are 15 to choose from and they include a laugh track, the trumpet call that starts a race, people saying "ohhhhhh," and more. The sounds laugh only about three or four seconds.
